

Disclosure Document: 8th Grade Health & Spanish

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Purpose and Objectives:

The purpose of 8th Grade Health is to learn to enhance health of body and mind. Students will comprehend the value of taking care of oneself and the long-term benefits of time and stress management, regular exercise, good nutrition, and being alcohol, drug and tobacco free.

In Spanish, students will continue the acquisition of Spanish as a second language while gaining an understanding and appreciation for diverse Spanish speaking cultures.

To accomplish these goals, we will focus on these objectives:

- Research information through means of the internet, books, and experts in their fields
- Utilize class time to practice the skills and apply understanding
- Use classroom lectures and activities, as well as homework to engage student learning and participation in and out of the class
- Use reading, writing, listening, and speaking to master skills and knowledge

Class Rules:

- ❖ Be Respectful—Be respectful to others' property, ideas and opinions, and right to learn. Raise your hand to speak, do not get out of your seat during lectures, and use hall passes only as needed. I will respect you, so please respect me by following instructions, keeping the classroom clean, and being an attentive listener.
- ❖ Be Honest—Always show me that I can trust you. Lying and cheating eventually backfire, so please show true integrity.
- ❖ Be Prepared—You are responsible to be in class on time and have all writing utensils, textbook, and other required materials at your desk when class begins.
- ❖ Be Obedient—Stay on task and follow directions the first time asked. This also goes for school rules: following the dress code, keeping all types of food, gum and drinks out of the classroom and halls, etc.

Consequences:

- ❖ First Offense: Verbal Warning
- ❖ Second Offense: Written Consequence in Discipline Log & Call Home
- ❖ Third Offense: Referral
- ❖ Fourth Offense: Principal/Parent/Teacher Conference

***I reserve the right to skip levels of consequences, depending on the type of offense. All of these offenses will have a direct impact on the conduct grade of the student.

Severe Clause: Any behavior that threatens bodily harm, damage to property, or stops this class from functioning will result in an immediate conference with the principal & a severe infraction referral.

Assignments and Homework:

- Your work will be **QUALITY**, reflecting **YOUR BEST EFFORT**—your handwriting legible, not just to you, written in blue or black pen (**NO PENCILS OR COLOR PENS**), and your assignments clean and free of rips, wrinkles, jagged edges, and/or doodles. Assignments should always include your name, student number and date in the **LEFTHAND** corner and subject, grade and assignment in the **RIGHTHAND** corner of the page. Writing must be in nice cursive or typed with the exception of vocabulary tests. Notes must be taken in the subject notebook and may be checked periodically for a grade. Assignments that are sloppy or that do not follow guidelines will be returned to student to be redone and handed in the following day with a penalty.

Late Work Policy:

- Your work will be handed in on time, in the specified assignment box for your class. An assignment that must be turned in late will only be accepted by Friday of the week it was due, and it will be docked one grade. If it is not turned in by Friday, it will remain a zero. One “late work pass” will be given each quarter in the case of an absolute emergency. This pass may be used up till the following Friday. No assignments will be accepted after that.

Absent Work:

- You are expected to be in class and on time each day. However, illnesses, emergencies, and unexpected situations occur and may result in absences. If you are aware that you **will** be absent for any reason, please notify me in class beforehand or by email to receive homework and/or instruction. For unplanned absences, your study partner will fill out each assignment that was given in every subject. You will find the sheet waiting for you when you return to school and have one week from your first day back to turn in all missed assignments. It is **your** responsibility to obtain and verify all missed work.

IN-CLASS MATERIALS NEEDED:

- A notebook or composition book for each subject to take notes and write vocabulary
- Loose sleeve paper to use for in-class assignments
- Plenty of blue or black pens
- Plenty of red pens for correcting assignments
- A two-pocket folder with three-hole fasteners for each subject
- Spanish/English Dictionary (I have 15 basic dictionaries that students may share **in class**.)

Texts:

- “Current Health”
- Juntos: Tres, Prentice Hall (1997)

***Texts must be covered

During the year in Health, we will learn about current health concepts, how to maintain and/or improve our nutrition and exercise habits, and discuss worthy goals for creating a personal healthy lifestyle. In Spanish we will learn about traveling, adventures, news, technology, communication, and family. We will learn new verb tenses and new vocabulary while discussing life and cultures of a variety of Spanish speaking countries.

Assignments and Assessments:

Practicing and assessing understanding will involve a variety of methods this year. This includes:

- Quizzes and/or assessments to evaluate student progress will be given 2-3times per quarter. A vocabulary test will be given weekly in Spanish
- One report or brochure on a Spanish-speaking country
- One project per quarter with an option of attending Spanish Mass as part of this project
- Daily assignments called “First things first” will start each class period
- Regular homework will be given to assist in language learning
- Attendance and participation for guest speakers, educational videos, and student presentations
